

To the Members of the Construction Industry:

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Senate Bill 285 which was passed by the 1971 California Legislature amends Sections 7071.6 and 7071.9 of the Contractors License Law. The amendments to Sections 7071.6 and 7071.9 increased the Contractor's Bond and Bond of Qualifying Individual from one thousand dollars, (\$1,000.00) to twenty-five hundred dollars, (\$2,500.00).

Laws passed at the 1971 Session of the Legislature will go into effect pursuant to the Constitution of the State of California on the sixty-first day after final adjournment of the Legislature. The date 1971 laws will become effective is March 4, 1972.

On March 4, 1972 all contractors with active licenses will be required to file or have on file a Contractor's Bond in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), or in lieu thereof a cash deposit in the amount of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00).

Any contractor whose license is qualified by a responsible managing employee or who has a supplemental classification qualified by a responsible managing employee will also be required to file a Bond of Qualifying Individual in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), or in lieu thereof a cash deposit in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,-500.00). This Bond of Qualifying Individual must be filed by each responsible managing employee who qualifies a primary or supplemental classification for a licensee. The Bond of Qualifying Individual must be filed by a responsible managing employee only, and is not required to be filed by an individual who qualifies his

To the Members of the Construction Industry:



LEGISLATION

The 1971 Legislative Session, while marathon in duration, produced relatively few changes in our Contractors License Law or other codes that are related to our activities. These changes will become effective on March 4, 1972 and are not necessarily all of the amendments, additions or deletions that may reflect directly or indirectly on the construction industry.

The Governor's reorganization plan which changed the name of the Department to Consumer Affairs has been implemented by legislation amending Sections of the Contractors License Law to reflect the new name and provide for the replacement of one general building contractor Board Member with another public member. The Contractors' State License Board will include two public members when the next general building contractor vacancy occurs. The other changes delete the requirement of signatures on a license certificate and set out the authority of the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs to transfer positions.

Section 7026.1 is added to the Contractors License Law to include within the definition of a contractor any person, not exempt as an employee with wages as his sole compensation, who maintains or services air-conditioning, heating or refrigeration equipment that is a fixed part of a structure.

Section 7028.4 is amended to include an association of contractors as one of the parties who may file for an injunction against an unlicensed contractor.

Sections 7071.6 and 7071.9 are amended to increase the amount of a contractor's bond and the RME bond from one thousand to twenty-five hundred dollars. For a licensee who has his license suspended or revoked, the reinstatement bond will be increased to a minimum seventy-five hundred and a maximum of twenty-five thousand dollars. The bond changes also include Section 7071.14, which was added to provide for recovery of damages when a contractor's bond is denied to a licensee or an applicant solely because of his race, religion or sex. Sections 7074 and 7074.5 were amended to clean up certain technical problems involving the time applications for an original license or additional classification will be held before

(Continued from column 2) they become void. Applicants mus pursue their applications within certain prescribed limits, generally six months, or the fees will be earned and the application voided.

Section 4104 of the Government Code, the Subletting and Subcontracting Fair Practices Act, was amended to include those who specially fabricate off the jobsite a portion of the work or improvement in an amount in excess of one-half of one percent of the prime contractor's total bid.

Section 23.8 of the Business and Professions Code was amended and renumbered Section 23.9 to provide that a person trained in a rehabilitation program while imprisoned shall not when released from prison be denied the right to take the next regularly scheduled licensing examination or any subsequent examination.

Section 128 is added to the Business and Professions Code and will make it a misdemeanor to sell equipment, supplies, or services to any person with knowledge that they are to be used in the performance of a service or contract in violation of the licensing requirements of the Code. The provisions are not applicable to cash sales of less

ówn license, a qualifying partner who jualifies a partnership license, or a responsible managing officer who qualifies a corporation license.

Pursuant to information received from the Office of the Attorney General, those persons (individuals, partnerships or corporations), who hold an inactive contractor's license will not be required to file or have on file a Contractor's Bond or Bond of Qualifying Individual if the inactive license is qualified by a responsible managing employee.

Section 7071.8 of the Contractors License Law sets the amount of disciplinary bonds at not less than three times nor more than ten times the amount of the Contractor's Bond. The amendments to Section 7071.6 and Section 7071.9 does not increase the amount of disciplinary bonds presently on file. However, any disciplinary bond filed on or after March 4, 1972 for restoration of a license by any person or firm whose license has been suspended or revoked or who comes ithin the provisions of paragraphs (2), (3) or (4) of Section 7071.8 will be required to be in the minimum amount of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) up to a maximum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,-000.00). This is in addition to the twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) Contractor's Bond and twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) Bond of Qualifying Individual, if such bond is required.

The March 4, 1972 date, relative to disciplinary bonds applies to the date disciplinary bonds are received in the Sacramento Headquarters Office of the Contractors' State License Board and not the date a license is suspended or revoked. It must be remembered that all conditions for the restoration of a contractor's license must be met prior to the March 4, 1972 date for the disciplinary bonds to be acceptable at the pre-amendment amounts. If all conditions are not met until March 4, 1972 or thereafter the increased disciplinary bonds will be required.

The same conditions apply regarding applications for new or reinstated licenses. If all conditions for issuance of a license are met prior to March 4, 1972 the pre-amendment amount for disciplinary bonds will be acceptable. If all conditions for issuance of a license are not met prior to March 4, 1972 all necessary bonds will be required to be in the increased amounts.

Failure of a holder of an active contractor's license to have on file a Contractor's Bond in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) or in lieu thereof a cash deposit in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) by March 4, 1972 will result in the license being suspended on March 4, 1972. The license will remain suspended until the increased bonding requirement is met.

Licenses qualified by a responsible managing employee will be suspended if the Bond of Qualifying Individual is not increased as required even though the Contractor's Bond may be sufficient to meet the new requirements. Any supplemental classifications qualified by responsible managing employees will be removed for failure to meet the increased bonding requirement by those responsible managing employees who qualify the supplemental classifications.

INCREASING SURETY BONDS ON FILE

Endorsement forms approved by the Office of the Attorney General for increasing Contractor's Bonds and Bonds of Qualifying Individual will be mailed to all surety companies who have written bonds as required by the Contractors License Law. If you have not been contacted by your bonding company relative to any requirements it may have for increasing your bond or bonds to the new required amount, it is suggested you contact your agent.

Bonding companies may increase the bonds by using a blanket endorsement or individual endorsements on the form approved by the Attorney General or by cancelling the old bonds and issuing new bonds in the proper amount.

ACCEPTABLE METHODS FOR INCREASING ALTERNATIVES IN LIEU OF CASH DEPOSITS

I Bank Certificates of Deposit

- 1. If deposit is to be made in the same bank where the \$1,000 Certificate of Deposit was obtained, an additional Certificate of Deposit in the sum of \$1,500 will be accepted.
- 2. If the deposit is to be made in a different bank than the one in which the \$1,000 Certificate of Deposit now on file was obtained:
 - (a) A Certificate of Deposit in the sum of \$2,500 should be submitted.
 - (b) The \$1,000 Certificate of Deposit will be returned to the Depositor as soon as practically possible.

II Savings and Loan Assignment

1. Investment Certificates

- (a) If a \$1,000 Investment Certificate with an Assignment for the \$1,000 is now on file:
 - (1) The Savings and Loan can send in a \$1,500 Investment Certificate with a \$2,500 Assignment. It can be shown on the \$2,500 Assignment that it supersedes the \$1,000 Assignment.
 - (2) The Contractors State License Board will then return the \$1,000 Assignment to the Savings and Loan.
- (b) The Savings and Loan may request the \$1,000 Investment Certificate be returned to it so that a new \$2,500 Investment Certificate can be substituted.
 - (1) The Contractors State License Board will retain the \$1,000 Assignment.
 - (2) The Savings and Loan can then send in a \$2,500 Investment Certificate and a \$2,500 Assignment. The Assignment can show that it supersedes the \$1,000 Assignment on file.

(3) Upon receipt of the \$2,500 Assignment, the Contractors State License Board will return the \$1,000 Assignment to the Savings and Loan.

2. Passbook Account

- (a) If an additional \$1,500 deposit is to be made in a Passbook Account:
 - (1) The Savings and Loan can send in a new \$2,500 Assignment with a temporary receipt indicating the account has been increased to \$2,500.
 - (2) The Contractors State License Board will send to the Savings and Loan the Passbook and the \$1,000 Assignment.
 - (3) The Savings and Loan can add the \$1,500 deposit in the Passbook and return the Passbook to the Contractors State License Board.
- Change from Passbook to Investment Certificate or from Investment Certificate to Passbook.
 - (a) If contractor has \$1,000 Passbook Account and wants to change to a \$2,500 Investment Certificate:
 - (1) He will be required to obtain the \$2,500 Investment Certificate and \$2,500 Assignment which will then be sent to the Contractors State License Board.
 - (2) Upon receipt of the \$2,500 Investment Certificate and \$2,500 Assignment, the Contractors State License Board will return the \$1,000 Passbook and \$1,000 Assignment to Savings and Loan for release to contractor.

- (b) If contractor has \$1,000 Investment Certificate Account and wants to change to a \$2,500 Passbook Account:
 - (1) He will be required to obtain and send to the Contractors State License Board, the Passbook showing a \$2,500 deposit and a \$2,500 Assignment.
 - (2) Upon receipt of the \$2,500
 Assignment and Passbook
 showing a \$2,500 deposit,
 the Contractors State License Board will return
 the \$1,000 Investment and
 \$1,000 Assignment to the
 Savings and Loan for release to the contractor.

ALTERNATIVE PROCEDURE FOR CHANGING FROM PASSBOOK TO INVESTMENT CERTIFICATE OR VICE VERSA IF PERMISSIBLE WITH SAVINGS AND LOAN

- 1. Change from Passbook to Investment Certificate
 - (a) Contractor deposits additional \$1,500 in Savings and Loan.
 - (b) Savings and Loan sets aside an account number which will be given to a \$2,500 Investment Certificate Account.
 - (c) Savings and Loan completes a \$2,500 Assignment showing account number which has been set aside. The Assignment can show that it supersedes the \$1,000 Assignment on file with Contractors State License Board.
 - (d) Savings and Loan mails \$2,500
 Assignment to the Contractors
 State License Board with letter indicating additional \$1,500 has been deposited and
 requesting the Passbook and
 \$1,000 Assignment be returned.
 - (e) Contractors State License Board will return Passbook and \$1,000 Assignment to Savings and Loan.

- (f) Savings and Loan will \$2,500 Investment Certificand mail to the Contractor State License Board.
- 2. Change from Investment Certificate to Passbook
 - (a) Contractor deposits additional \$1,500 in Savings and Loan.
 - (b) Savings and Loan sets aside an account number which will be given to a \$2,500 Passbook Account.
 - (c) Savings and Loan completes a \$2,500 Assignment showing account number which has been set aside. The Assignment can show that it supersedes the \$1,000 Assignment on file with the Contractors State License Board.
 - (d) Savings and Loan mails \$2,500
 Assignment to the Contractors
 State License Board with letter indicating additional \$1,500 has been deposited and requesting the Investment Certificate and \$1,000 Assignment be returned.
 - (e) Contractors State License Board will return \$1,000 Investment Certificate and \$1,000 Assignment to Savings and Loan.
 - (f) Savings and Loan will send Passbook showing \$2,500 deposit with account number previously assigned.
 - NOTE: Investment Certificates or Passbook Accounts will be acceptable if they contain a penalty clause which will have the effect of, at any time, depleting the account to an amount less than the Assignment, only if a quarters interest in the amount specified by the penalty clause is maintained in the account and not accrued to the depositor. The Assignment need only show that amount required by the Contractors License Law (\$2,-500). When an Assignment is issued to cover the bond requirement of a license already issued, the license number should appear in the upper right-hand corner of the Assignment.

III Cash

Certified or Cashiers Check in the sum of \$1,500 will be accepted to in crease the \$1,000 Cash presently on deposit to \$2,500.

CONSUMER COMPLAINTS

During an average fiscal year, the field personnel of the Contractors' State License Board will investigate in excess of 12,000 complaints against licensees. The number of licensees concerned is a very small percentage of our total registration.

We also investigate over 5,000 complaints against non-licensees. This phase of our activities involves entirely different procedures and will be covered in detail in a later edition of our bulletin.

Most of you have never been involved in this phase of our operation. It may be of interest to know how such investigations are conducted and the results obtained.

The majority of complaints are filed by homeowners who, for one reason or another, are faced with a real or possible injury because of the workmanship or default of the contractor. These complaints cover a wide field—some are of a minor nature and easily resolved, while others can be quite complex and may involve considerable sums of money.

Our Deputy Registrars are qualified construction people and many are experts in their particular field. Through training and years of experience they have gained additional expertise in the problems of the consumer as well as those of the contractor and the application of the provisions of the Contractors' License Law. We also have access to experts in other fields when needed.

It has always been the policy of the Registrar and the Board that our field personnel approach every complaint against a licensee with the avowed purpose of reaching a mutually satisfactory and equitable settlement within the framework of the law. That this policy has been effective is evidenced by the fact that over 47% of all complaints are settled.

The complaint we receive reflects but one side of the dispute or problem. The position of the contractor may be diametrically opposed. It is the function of our Deputies to impartially and objectively evaluate the position of each party. In many cases, the matter can easily be resolved by assisting the parties in reaching a settlement. Other cases may require broad and lengthy investigations before a proper disposition can be made.

The basic determination to be made in any investigation is "Has there been a violation of the Contractors' License Law." As a licensed contractor, you have a right to know in what manner you have violated the law. If you agree with the Deputy's findings, you will be granted a reasonable time in which to meet your responsibilities. If you do not agree you may request the Deputy's supervisor to review the matter.

It is not our intention that any contractor will be faced with a determination by one of our Deputies that is not based on factual evidence of a violation of the law. When a Deputy finds that a complaint must be dismissed he is then faced with one of his more difficult tasks-convincing the complainant that disciplinary action could not be sustained or that the settlement of the complaint is not the responsibility of the contractor. This often requires the utmost in tact and skill. The average consumer finds it difficult to comprehend that a licensing agency cannot, in all cases, require remedial performance by a licensee. In the absence of any obvious violation of the law, every contractor has moral and ethical obligations and should base his decisions on what he feels is his responsibility and what is good business prac-

When a material violation of the law exists and no settlement can be made, the last recourse is to refer the matter to disciplinary action. An accusation will be filed, which will set forth the alleged violations. The licensee may request a hearing at which he will be afforded every opportunity to present his defense. Disciplinary action is a quasi-judicial proceeding involving substantial rights and privileges and is not filed frivolously nor

without due consideration of the evidence and all other factors involved.

When an accusation is filed it is with a reasonable certainty that the allegations will be sustained. This is reflected in our statistics that show approximately 90% of the contractors named in disciplinary proceedings are found to have violated the law and are faced with some type of disciplinary order. It is also a tribute to the construction industry as a whole that in any fiscal year the disciplinary actions filed involve less than one per cent of the total of licensed contractors.

We take a great deal of pride in the accomplishments of our field personnel. Each of them has a unique position in the field of law enforcement in that the initial determination in any case is made by the Deputy to whom it is assigned. While his determination is not necessarily final—every case is subject to review—a reversal by his superiors or a reinvestigation is rarely required.

We continue to strive to improve our operation and to field a staff which will more effectively serve the consumer and, in so doing, benefit the construction industry. Your courtesy and cooperation with our field staff has been appreciated in the past and we look forward to pleasant relations in the future.

DONALD G. LIVINGSTON, DIRECTOR

Donald G. Livingston was appointed by Governor Reagan as Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs on October 1, 1971. Livingston, who has served with the administration since 1967, previously was Assistant Secretary of the Agriculture and Services Agency. He has also served as Chief Deputy Director of the Department of General Services and as Chief of the Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Professional and Vocational Standards and as Chief of the Bureau of Furniture and Bedding Inspection.

Prior to joining the administration, Livingston was Assistant to the Minority Caucus in the State Assembly from 1965 to 1967. From 1961 to 1965 Livingston was in sales administration with Kaiser Alumnium in Oakland.

He is a graduate of San Francisco State College with an A.B. degree in Urban Studies. During 1960 he served as Student Body President at San Francisco State College. His graduate studies include serving as an Intern in Public Affairs with the Coro Foundation of San Francisco in 1960–61. He has also done graduate work in Public Administration at Golden Gate College in San Francisco.

Livingston is a third generation resident of California, born in Oakland in 1938. His public service includes serving as a member and Vice Chairman of the Oakland City Planning Commission for three years (the youngest man to serve on a major municipal commission in the city's history), a member of the Board of Directors of the Oakland Symphony Association, and a member of the Board of Directors and Vice President of the San Francisco State College Alumni Association.

Livingston, at 33, is the youngest Director in the history of the Department. He lives with his wife Dodie in Carmichael.

than one hundred dollars, and a violation of this section shall be punishable by a fine of not less than one thousand dollars and by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding six months.

In addition to the above brief outline, the Administrative Procedure Act was amended to require the same hearing officer to re-hear formal cases that are not adopted by the Agency and referred back for additional evidence.

The Small Claims Court limits were increased to \$500, and the "Home Solicitation Act" which provides for three days to cancel a purchase and receive the down payment back less a small fee was reported in our last issue.

Manufacturers and dealers must warrant that a mobile home is free from any substantial defects in materials or workmanship and that if the buyer or his transferee gives the required notice the manufacturer, dealer or both shall take appropriate corrective action at the site in instances of substantial defects in materials or workmanship which become evident within one year from delivery of the mobile home.
