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LEGISLATION: 1972

The following bills passed by the 1972 Session of the Legislature and which was signed by the Governor, becomes effective on the 61st day after the final adjournment of the Legislature, unless otherwise provided for in the bill. The date is contemplated to be around March 9, 1977.

Senate Bill 239, which adds Section 7030.5 to the Contractors' License Law, was passed by the Legislature, and signed by the Governor on June 7, 1972.

Basically, Senate Bill 239 provides that beginning July 1, 1973, each licensed contractor shall include his license number in all construction contracts, subcontracts, calls for bid and all forms of advertising. For purposes of the new law, the term "advertising" will have the same meaning as that provided in Section 7026.7 of the Contractors' License Law, which defines "advertising" to include the issuance of any card, sign, or device to Continued on page 2, col. 3

REVISIONS IN THE CLASSIFICATIONS OF CONTRACTORS

At its January 21, 1972, meeting, the Contractors' State License Board amended Section 752 which covers the C-21 (Home and Building Moving, Wrecking Contractors) classification. The amended section became effective on March 1, 1972, and is set out below:

752. Class C-21—House and Building Moving, Wrecking Contractors. A house and building moving, wrecking contractor is a specialty contractor whose contracting business is limited to the execution of contracts requiring the ability, experience and knowledge to raise, lower, crib, underpin, wreck, and move or remove buildings and structures in whole, or in

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any person, or causing or permittin, any sign or marking on or in any building, newspaper, magazine or in any directory under a listing of contractor. This includes "letterheads".

Sections 7028 and 7028.1 of the Contractors' License Law have been amended by Senate Bill 247, which was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor on June 7, 1972.

Generally, Sections 7028 and 7028.1 of the Contractors' License Law were both amended to include minimum penalties in addition to the penalties already contained therein.

Section 7028 was amended to provide for a minimum fine of \$100.00 and/or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than 10 days for anyone who acts in the capacity of a contractor without being properly licensed and who has previously been convicted of such a violation.

Section 7028.1 has been amended to provide for a minimum fine of \$500.00 and/or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than one month for anyone who accepts or receives a completion certificate or other evidence that performance of a contract for work of improvement is complete with knowledge that such document is false and who shall in any way use such document either to receive payment from the owner or to obtain any credit or loan on the security of the right to receive any payment.

Assembly Bill 1034 has been passed and signed by the Governor on August 10, 1972. The bill adds Section 7029.6 to the Contractors' License Law and requires licensed plumbing contractors to have their name, permanent business address, and contractor's license number in letters at least one and one-half inches high on each side of each vehicle used in his business. Vehicles which would be subject to this section are those which are registered as a commercial vehicle under the vehicle code. The provisions of this section become operative on July 1, 1973.

Assembly Bill 616, which adds Section 7030 to the Contractors' License Law, was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor on July 28, 1972. The bill provides as follows:

7030. (a) Every person licensed pu suant to this chapter shall include the following statement in prominent type or Continued on page 3, col. 1

(b) For the purposes of subdivision (a) "prominent type" means at least 10-point bold face type, and in no event type less than two points larger than the type in any other portion of the written contract. This act shall become operative on July 1, 1973.

The new law essentially provides that beginning July 1, 1973, all licensees, who are the prime contractor with respect to a contract, must include in the contract the following statement in 10-point bold face type, but it cannot be in type less than two points larger than the type in the other parts of the contract:

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parts, either upon the present site, or to and upon another site, but does not include the alterations, additions, repairs or rehabilitation to the permanently retained portions of such buildings or structures as remains after being moved, raised, lowered, cribbed or underpinned.

The main thrust of the new section is that contractors having a C-21 license can only pick up and move a building to a new location, or demolish the building. The C-21 classification does not now allow the rehabilitation or repairs on a structure after it has been moved. The rehabilitation or repairs on moved buildings or structures now requires the "B" General Building classification. Anyone licensed under the C-21 classification who is presently engaged in the practice of rehabilitating structures after they have been moved, should file an application for a supplemental "B" classification.

At its July 26, 1972, meeting, the Board further amended Section 752. This amendment went into effect on

September 2, 1972, and merely revises the title of the classification, and deletes some of the non-essential language in the section. The C-21 classification will now be entitled "Building Moving, Wrecking Contractors". The change in language has no effect on the classification as it was amended at the January 21, 1972 regular meeting of the board. Section 752 now reads as follows:

Class C-21—Building Moving, Wrecking Contractors. A building moving, wrecking contractor is a specialty contractor whose contracting business is the execution of contracts to raise, lower, crib, underpin, wreck and move or remove buildings and structures in whole, or in parts, either upon the present site, or to and upon another site, but does not include the alterations, additions, repairs or rehabilitation to the permanently retained portions of such buildings or structures as remains after being moved, raised, lowered, cribbed or underpinned.

The Board, at its July 26, 1972, meeting, made a significant amendment to Section 741 of the Board's Rules and Regulations. Section 741 covers the C-15 (Flooring and Floor Covering Contractors) classification. The C-15 classification has been expanded to include all types of flooring and floor covering. Prior to being amended, the C-15 classification was only concerned with wood flooring. Following is Section 741 as amended:

Class C-15-Flooring and Floor Covering Contractors. A flooring and floor covering contractor is a specialty contractor who executes contracts requiring the contractor to intelligently examine surfaces, specify and execute the preliminary and preparatory work necessary for the installation of flooring and floor coverings, and, the installation through any approved method of flooring and floor covering materials, wherever installed, including carpet, resilient sheet goods, resilient tile, wood floors and flooring (including the selection, cutting, laying, finishing, repairing, scraping, sanding, filling, staining, shellacking and waxing) and all flooring and floor covering materials of any nature either developed as, or established through custom and usage as flooring and floor covering materials, but shall not include the work of any other specialty contractor classification defined in this article.

Those contractors who do work with other than wood flooring are presently licensed under the C-61 Limited Specialty classification designated as "Floor Covering". The net result of the amended section is that those contractors presently doing flooring and floor covering work under a C-61 classification with the designation of "Floor Covering" only, will be ad-

ministratively reclassified under the amended C-15 (Flooring and Floor Covering) classification. All those licensees who have the C-61 Floor Covering classification should return their large license certificate and current pocket certificate to the Contractors' License Board to have their classification changed to the C-15. There will be no charge for this change in classification, nor will an examination be required.

For those licensees who have a C-61 license that includes more than just "Floor Covering", the procedure will be somewhat different. These licensees must file an application for a supplemental C-15 (Flooring and Floor Covering) classification. This will require a \$20.00 application fee. No examination will be required to obtain the supplemental C-15 classification. The C-61 classification will remain in effect for the other limited specialty categories included on the license.

At its July 26, 1972, meeting, the Board also adopted minor amendments to Sections 745 and 754.4 of the Board's Rules and Regulations, which deal mainly with title changes in the C-12 and C-42 classifications respectively. The C-12 classification. formerly entitled "Excavating, Grading, Trenching, Paving and Surfacing Contractors", is now entitled "Earthwork and Paving Contractors". The C-42 classification is now entitled "Sanitation System Contractors", where before it was entitled "Sewer, Sewage Disposal and Drain Cement Pipe Laying Contractors".

The amendments to the C-12 and C-42 classifications made title changes and deleted some non-essential language which resulted in no substantive changes. The classifications cover work exactly as previously covered under the preamended versions of the classifications. Following are Sections 745 and 754.4 as amended:

Class C-12—Earthwork and Paving Contractors. An earthwork and paving contractor is a speciality contractor whose contracting business is the execution of contracts to dig, move, and place material forming the surface of the earth, other than air and water, in such a manner that a cut, fill, excavation, grading, trenching, backfilling, tunneling, if incidental thereto,

WHAT CONSTITUTES FRAUD

The purpose of this article is to familiarize the reader with the various elements of fraud. Most of the claims regarding fraud in the construction industry are based on misrepresentations allegedly made by one party to another.

To establish a cause of action for fraud based on misrepresentation, a plaintiff must show several things. First, the representation must have been as to a material fact. Second, the representation must have been false and known to be false by the party making it, or else it must have been made recklessly, or without reasonable grounds for believing its truth. Third, the representation must have been made with the intent to induce the plaintiff to do or refrain from doing some act. Fourth, the plaintiff must have acted in reliance on the representation made by the defendant. Fifth, that the plaintiff in acting the way he did, was ignorant of the falsity of the representation and reasonably believed it to be true. Finally, the plaintiff must have suffered damage or injury. The absence for any of the above elements is generally fatal to an action for fraud.

The misrepresentation must be as to a fact as opposed to a mere opinion. The misrepresentation must also be material. The test for materiality is generally whether the misrepresentation was of such a character that, had it not been made, the transaction would not have been entered into. The representations must also have been false.

As pointed out earlier, a necessary element of actual fraud is the intent by the defendant to either deceive the plaintiff or to induce the plaintiff to enter into a transaction. One who uses deceit with intent to defraud the public or a particular class of persons, is deemed to have intended to defraud every individual in the class who is actually mislead.

A fraudulent misrepresentation, to be actionable, must be made with knowledge that it is false or may be false. Fraud may also be based on negligent as well as wilful misrepresentations.

The plaintiff must have acted in reliance on the misrepresentation and must be justified in such reliance. In other words, the injured party's reliance must have been reasonable and based on a reasonable belief in the truth of the representation. For example, a purchaser has the right to rely on representations of a vendor as to material facts not within the purchaser's knowledge. Representations may be actionable where made under circumstances that the speaker must have reasonably anticipated that the injured party would hear and act on those representations.

Where there is no confidential or special trust relationship and where the means of knowledge are present and equally available to each party, and the subject matter is open to their inspection, if one of the parties does not avail himself of those opportunities when he could have attained the truth by ordinary diligence, then his failure to so act is deemed to be negligent and he will not be allowed to claim that he was deceived by the other person's misrepresentations, Where one is justified in relying and in fact does rely on false representations, his right of action is not destroyed because means of knowledge were open to him.

The situation where a person receives notice of facts and circumstances which would put an ordinarily prudent person on inquiry has the same result in the law as where a person has knowledge of all the facts that a reasonably diligent inquiry would disclose. Thus, it is an established principle that though a person in the original instance may have been justified in relying on representations, but thereafter discovers that he has been deceived as to one material matter, he has notice that he may have been deceived as to other matters and has a duty to make a full investigation.

Fraud may also consist of concealment which is the suppression of that which it is one's duty to declare, as opposed to a misrepresentation which is a false declaration. Where there exists a relation of trust and confi-

dence, it is the duty of the one in whom the confidence is reposed to make full disclosure of all material facts within his knowledge relating to the transaction in question and any concealment of material facts in such circumstances constitutes frand. Where there is a duty to disclose, such disclosure must be full and complete, and any material concealment or misrepresentation will entitle the injured party to maintain an action for fraud. One cannot claim fraudulent concealment where he is possessed of sufficient information to charge him with the knowledge he would have gained had he made a diligent inquiry.

A person will not be charged with concealment of any fact unless he is under some obligation to disclose it and mere omission to make mention of a fact, unless he had knowledge of or had notice that he was required to make such mention, does not constitute fraud. In other words, in the absence of a confidential relationship between parties or other special circumstances raising a duty to speak, mere silence will not support a charge of fraud based on concealment.

The remedies allowed in an action for fraud are either recission or damages. Also, every person connected with the fraud is liable for the full amount of damages.

and any similar excavating, grading and trenching operation can be executed, including the use of explosives in connection therewith; or the mixing, fabricating and placing of paving and surfacing materials and to do any part, or any combination thereof.

Class C-42-Sanitation System Contractors. A sanitation system contractor is a specialty contractor whose contracting business is the execution of contracts to fabricate and/or install concrete and masonry sewer, sewage disposal and drain structures and lay cast-iron, steel, concrete, vitreous and nonvitreous pipe for sewers, sewage disposal, drains and irrigation, including the excavating, grading, trenching, backfilling, paving and surfacing only in connection therewith; the fabrication and erection of sewage disposal plants, cesspools and septic tanks and the appurtenances thereto, in such a manner, that sewers, sewage disposal, drains and cement pipe laying can be fabricated and installed.

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NOTICE...TO HOLDERS OF INACTIVE LICENSES

Assembly Bill 65, which amended Section 7076.5 of the Contractors' License Law, was recently passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor. The new law will probably go into effect sometime around March 10, 1973, depending upon when the Legislature is finally adjourned.

In the June, 1972, edition of this publication, an article stated that Section 7076.5 provides for any license which had been inactive for a period exceeding ten years would automatically be revoked. This section which originally became law on October 1, 1962 made provisions for inactivating licenses immediately after September 30, 1972 by the filing of an application or for inactivating the license at the beginning of the renewal period by so noting on the renewal application and submission of the proper fee.

Section 7076.5, as amended, does not include the provision requiring the automatic revocation of a license that has been inactive for a period exceeding ten years. The new Section 7076.5 will have the effect of treating the provision for automatic revocation of a license after ten years as if the provision never existed. Although the new section does not go into effect until around five months after October 1, 1972, which is the earliest possible date the automatic revocation provision could have any effect, the registrar has determined that the automatic revocation provision will not be enforced. In other words, there should not exist any cause for concern on behalf of a holder of an inactive license that his license would be revoked even though the person inactivated his license during the period between October 1962 and March 1963.

It should be made absolutely clear that NO INACTIVE LICENSES WILL BE REVOKED FOR BEING ON AN INACTIVE STATUS FOR A PERIOD EXCEEDING TEN YEARS.

Several conditions must be met before an inactive license can be reinstated. First, the license must not be suspended or revoked. Second, there must not exist grounds for disciplinary action as determined by the registrar. The applicant for reinstatement of an inactive license must also have renewed his inactive license and paid the proper renewal fee as required by the Contractors' License Law.

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In addition to meeting the above conditions, the applicant to reinstate an inactive license must submit an Application To Reinstate Inactive State Contractor's License, pay a fee of \$60.00, file a \$2,500.00 Contractor's Bond (and RME Bond if required) or cash deposit, or the alternatives to the cash deposit, and further submit a financial statement with an opinion report or certificate of an independent C.P.A. or P.A. No examination is required to reinstate an inactive license.
